## DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know that Smithfield, IL, had a bustling "Meat Market" in the early years after the turn of the century (1900)? The market building was built and operated by James Pierce McCaughey. He was born in 1852 and raised in Bernadotte, IL. As a young man, he played baseball, a good pitcher who took part in Sunday afternoon ball games at Tuthill Park in Bernadotte and surrounding towns. Jim's earliest occupation was as a painter. He also worked with his father, Harrison, at the National Hotel in Vermont, IL.

He later moved to Smithfield to build and open his meat market. He was Justice of the Peace for many years. He moved to Glendale, AZ, in the 1920s, to work with his son-in-law, James Huett, to operate his grocery store. In the later years, the former meat market building in Smithfield became the Grange Hall.

During the late 1800s and into the early 1900s, small businesses like grocery stores, taverns and saloons gave away small mini-jugs to promote their respective businesses, usually during the holiday season. The jugs typically contained vinegar, cider or whiskey.

Pictured here is an example of the mini-jug McCaughey gave away at his meat market. Advertising mini-jugs are quite rare from small towns like Smithfield, and they are highly prized by collectors today.

James P. McCaughey's grandson and namesake, "Jim," may have been influenced by his grandfather's occupation. Jim McCaughey was Managing Chef at Wee Ma Tuk Hills Country Club for many years.

# "CLOSING THE GAP" (FROM 1975 TO 2023)

A unique public event about the lives of well-known, interesting, and influential people of the past from the Canton area takes place Sunday, October 1, 2023. It's the annual Cemetery Walk hosted by the Heritage Center. These people each made significant contributions in the past 50 years, between 1975 and now. "We are 'closing the gap' in local history, the period between Canton's Sesquicentennial and the upcoming Bicentennial, by focusing on these leaders," explained Mike Walters, historian and author.

The six people to be portrayed are...

\*\*\*Dorothy Fennell, a member of team of scientists at the Peoria Ag Research Laboratory who developed a way to mass-produce penicillin in the 1940s. She'll be portrayed by Belle Hardy.

\*\*\*Charlotte Bennett, a strong advocate for the arts and music in the area. The portrayal will be by Andrea Barbknecht.

\*\*\*Bill Cook, who founded what is now the largest privately owned medical device company in the world. He'll be portrayed by Mike Krulac.

\*\*\*Charlie Wright, the longtime owneroperator of WBYS radio, will be portrayed by Kevin Stephenson.

\*\*\*Kay Ragsdale, a world-renowned flutist, who performed and travelled for many years with the stage musical, *The Lion King*. She'll be portrayed by Carol Davis.

\*\*\*Bob Ems, the longtime executive director of the Canton Park District. Ems will be portrayed by Bob Juraco.

What makes the event especially unique is where it takes place. The site is Greenwood Cemetery at 640 South Main Street in Canton. There will be three, approximately one-hour performances. The first one at 3:00 p.m. will be on a stage in front of the mausoleum. Visitors are urged to bring lawn chairs. Trees provide some shade, but bringing an umbrella to block the sun is recommended. Golf carts will take visitors from the parking area to the performance area. Restrooms will be available.

The next two performances, walking tours, are set for 4:15 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. Portable sound

systems will be used at each site to make sure everyone hears the narrative.

There is no admission charge for the Cemetery Walk, but donations are welcome. Net proceeds from the event will help support our programs and activities.

Women trailblazers from the Canton area are now on display at the center. Title 9 legislation (requiring equal opportunities for girls and women in public school sports programs since 1972) has made a big difference, providing resources and recognition for girls and women. We wanted to recognize our own talented athletes.

Meet five women who made their mark in sports at Canton High School and the universities they attended. These women have all been inducted into Canton High School's Hall of Fame. You'll learn more about their accomplishments, families and careers at the museum, in late October.

Virginia McBroom Barnard, Friend, \*2006. 1938 graduate; attended University of Illinois. Faithfully attended Canton sports for years, at her favorite seat in the gym. Inducted by Illinois Basketball Coaches Assn. Hall of Fame, 1994; Canton Little Giants Hall of Fame, 2006. Virginia died April 11, 2017; legacy as super fan intact.

Nora Weber Corbitt, Track & Field, Basketball, \*2006. 1993 graduate. Overcame a fall at the state meet to win 4th Honor Roll high jump. 1993

state high jump champion (5'9"). IL Gatorade Circle of Champions. CHS career rebounding record. At University of Illinois, tied for 4th in high jump, NCAA. Lives in Bridgewater, NJ.

Alicia Curtis, Softball, Basketball, Volleyball \*2011. 1983 graduate. All conference honors in volleyball (2 years); softball (3 years). Batting average, .418-.390. Played on ICC and Bradley teams. In amateur career at Delevan, named National All-American Team as outfielder. Lives in Germantown Hills.

Sarah Taylor Hopwood, Basketball, \*2013. 1994 graduate. 4-year varsity basketball. All-time scoring with 1245 points until 2019. Led in double figure scoring (26). First in consecutive games making 22 3-point shots in single season. First Team All-Conference. Lives in Dunlap.

Nancy Rabel, Basketball, Softball, Volleyball, \*2008. 1990 graduate. Only girl on early teams; Elem./Jr. High State Basketball Champions, 1984. Ranked 1st-8th every basketball statistic in history of Lady Giants. Led in runs scored, 2nd team All Conference softball. Top of all career volleyball statistics. Set basketball records at SRC and Knox College. Lives in Urbana.
